### **Overview**

Federico Ivanier is an expert at creating spine-tingling atmospheres and his latest release is a masterclass in this artform. The novel combines two narratives, one where we learn about Fruli and his homelife situation, and the second where we accompany him on an nightmarish adventure into the Sleeping House.

Federico also employs an interesting device into his writing where he includes the adjective in brackets between lines, so we could say that this is an (interesting)

way of writing, which could inspire young writers to experiment with their own practice. This would also be a

(fun)

translation challenge for me as the the translator.

Many of Ivanier's stories see young people living in difficult or non-traditional family set-ups. Our protagonist Fruli's home life is difficult, his father has died and his mum is now involved with a man to whom his father owed a debt: el Sueco. There appears to be no escape from this man and no way to get rid of him until the debt is repaid.

There has been much talk of an abandonned house out on the hillside, a place his father apparently used to withdraw to, but does it really exist? Fruli sets out to find out, discovering far more than he was ever expecting, and a way to rid his family of El Sueco for good.

### To be aware of

There are spiders - lots of spiders - and spiders webs. Fruli ultimately gets revenge on El Sueco who meets a rather unpleasant end in the Sleeping House.

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
